Angles</p> <p>Angles are all around us. An angle is created when two straight lines meet. Learn how to recognise different types of turns and angles. https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/articles/zwy3trd</p> <p>Task - Write your name using capital letters. Can you identify angles in your name? Make a right angle checker and go on a hunt around your house and see how many right-angles you can find.</p> <p>2. Comparing types of angles</p> <p>A right angle looks like the corner of a square. It is a perfect 90°, which is shown by a small square drawn in between the two lines. </p> <p>An acute angle is an angle less than 90° (smaller than a right angle) </p> <p>An obtuse angle is an angle that is bigger than 90° degrees, but doesn't reach a straight line. <p><u>Science - Rain Gauge</u></p> <p>You need: 2 litre plastic bottle Scissors, tape, Sand, Marker pen, Ruler</p> <p>Instructions: Take an empty 2 litre bottle. Ask an adult to cut off the spout where the curve begins. Fill bottle with $\frac{1}{2}$ inch of sand to keep it from falling over. Pour in just enough water so you see the water level above the sand. Yes your sand will be wet! This is called your saturation point. Use Marker pen to draw a line at the saturation point and write "starting point" Line the ruler up (from the saturation point) and draw a line for every inch up to the top of the bottle. Take the top "cut off" spout portion of the bottle and flip it upside down. Insert it into the bottle and use some tape to secure it. This will help to catch and collect rainfall. Many people quickly learn to touch type faster than they can write with a pen. The important things to remember are:</p>	<p><u>Art - CLAUDE MONET</u></p> <p>Have you ever wanted to capture a moment? To make a picture that shows not just how something looks, but also how it makes you feel? Meet the man who did just that!</p> <p>https://www.tate.org.uk/kids/explore/who-is/who-claude-monet</p> <p>Look at the painting of Water-Lilies.</p>  <p>Can you see the shapes of the flat leaves and pale flowers on the shimmering water?</p> <p>It was painted by artist Claude Monet who was one of the main impressionist artists. Impressionism is a style of painting that began in France in the early 1860s when artists started painting outside, rather than in their studios. This was called 'en plein air' (which is French for open air). They wanted to capture moments in time. Because the light conditions kept changing, they had to work quickly, using quick brushstrokes of paint.</p> <p>Look closely at the painting, can you see how Monet has tried to capture light and reflection on the surface of the water by using dabs of white paint? Think of each of your five senses in turn or ask an adult to call each one out (sight, smell, sound, taste, touch)</p> <p>Slowly, try to notice everything you can with each one of you senses.</p> <p>When you have finished breathe deeply and then stop.</p>

<p>The rain gauge collects water. When water drips or pours into your rain gauge you can accurately measure how much rainfall has occurred.</p>	<p>Use the correct fingers, There's no need to rush!, Always rest your wrists on the desk. You should take a rest, and shake your hands and arms to relax your muscles if you get tired.</p>	<p>Task Have a go at drawing or painting in the same style as Monet. You could try painting outside and using daps of white to show light in your picture.</p>	<p><i>The five senses exercise is also really great to use when you go out for a walk or visit somewhere new!</i></p>

More science - Extra Rain Gauge Experiments:

Make multiple rain gauges. Place one in an open area outside, one underneath a tree, and one by edge of your roof. Are you getting different measurements of rainfall? If so, why do you think that is? And which one do you think is the most accurate reading?

Add 1/4, 1/2, 3/4 inch measurements onto your rain gauge so you get a more specific and accurate reading.
